Jennifer Breakspear is a prolific non-profit leader in British Columbia and a graduate of the Public Policy Institute's Class of 2013. A true trailblazer and changemaker in the non-profit sector, Jennifer is also the first recipient of the Ida Goodreau Alumni Award.

Jennifer is an alum of the Public Policy Institute Class of 2013 and at that time was the Executive Director at Options (Opt) for Sexual Health. As part of her studies at the Public Policy Institute, Jennifer focused on the public health policy initiative of implementing a province-wide HPV vaccination program for all school-aged children to decrease the prevalence of cervical cancer.

Jennifer's extensive career as a non-profit leader also includes her current role as Executive Director at SARA for Women in the Fraser Valley, and previous roles as Executive Director at QMUNITY – BC's Queer Resource Centre and at PHS Community Services Society in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside.

In addition to her current role at SARA, Jennifer also supports leadership in the non-profit sector as a consultant through her firm, Breakspear Leadership and Training and also as an instructor for SFU Continuing Studies Non-Profit Management Program.

Sherry attended the Public Policy Institute in 2014 on behalf of L.I.N.C. and her project focused on the District of Mission's food strategy. Fast-forward seven years later, L.I.N.C. now manages Emma's Acres which is a nationally recognized, award-winning agricultural social enterprise. Emma's Acres provides offenders with employment skills and reintegration supports as they are transitioned out of prison. It also serves as a place of healing for survivors of serious crime and both these groups, work alongside community members. The farm seeks to enhance the food security in the District of Mission by creating

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a year-round local source of food. But more importantly, the farm is a place of reintegration, restoration, and healing.

Sherry continues to use the learnings from PPI to advocate for reforms in the Correctional Service of Canada (CSC) system. Her work focuses now on pioneering the use of cultural assessments. The CSC has acknowledged that the assessments they currently use are biased against Indigenous offenders and offenders of African descent. And she is focused on making having those acknowledgements turn into actions of change.

PPI is proud to give Sherry the 2021 Ida Goodreau Alumni Award for her contributions to the non-profit sector and her roles as an advocate and ally as she continues to make meaningful change in the space.

this year, PPI is honouring Erin O'Melinn, the Executive Director of Hub Cycling. Erin played an integral leadership role in gaining government support for universally accessible school cycling education in BC. Erin graduated from the Public Policy Institute in 2014.



At the time, the "Bike Right" initiative did not have any public funding and awareness was low. HUB Cycling and its partners have since reached over 21,000 students in over 200 schools with transportation

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cycling education, including in-class and on bike training. Funding exceeds \$500,000 annually from the Province of BC.

Erin credits the Public Policy Institute for equipping her with the tools needed to take the policy proposal to the next level. Erin learned to tailor the “Bike Right” proposal to help meet the province’s climate change goals, as cycling is a sustainable mode of transportation, with benefits around health, affordability, equity, and access.

“It’s the long game. Policy change and programming change at a broad level takes time and patience, and that’s what they told us in the Public Policy Institute is you’re going to be putting in a lot of hard work and shaping things, developing them, making collaborative relationships, relationships with government, and you may not feel progress, but once you get it shelf ready and a political window opens, then it’ll be ready to push through the window,” Erin says.
